



# 30 YEARS OF PUFFIN RESTORATION YIELDS SUCCESS


## Seal Island NWR: 28% Increase!

he Seal Island National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) puffin restoration project began in 1984 when the first of 950 puffin chicks were translocated from Great Island, Newfoundland. In 1992, seven pairs nested—the first puffins to breed on the island since 1887 when the original colony was lost due to excessive hunting for food and feathers. Although the restored colony was slow to start, its subsequent annual growth has been remarkable. This year the colony increased by 28% to 231 breeding pairs—an addition of 52 pairs to the 2002 total of 179. The number of breeding pairs is only one measure of success. Supervisor Carlos Zavalaga and his research team documented a record high count of 395 individuals on July 18th and about 3/4 of the pairs succeeded in rearing a chick (puffins lay just one egg per year).



# Eastern Egg Rock: 13% Increase!

n our 30th year of working to restore the Egg Rock puffin colony, we tallied a total of 59 breeding pairs—a 13% increase since 2002. Egg Rock researchers led by supervisor Ellen Peterson tallied a record high count of 101 individuals and an impressive fledging success of 0.86 chicks per pair. All of the puffins in the Adopt-A-Puffin program returned this year. Since most of the Egg Rock puffins wear numbered leg bands, observers discover detailed histories about puffin mating habits. For example, puffins are typically very faithful to their burrow and usually to their mate from one year to the next. Puffin Y54 (a 26-year-old male transplanted



from Newfoundland in 1977) holds the record for retaining the same burrow for 22 years! The record for mate fidelity is held by EN 53 (a 24-year-old female transplanted from Newfoundland in 1979) and U02 (a male of unknown origin). They have nested in the same burrow for 17 years! This summer, researchers were elated when they discovered that Bi 76, a 23-year-old male translocated to Egg Rock from Newfoundland in 1978, was nesting. Even though he had been present at his burrow for the past six years, he could not attract a mate. However, this summer, researchers found him with an unbanded female and together they successfully reared a chick—his first in six years.

# Matinicus Rock: Record High Count—256 Pairs!

From a low of just two puffin pairs in 1900, the Matinicus puffin colony has steadily recovered to 256 pairs this summer. This increase was due in part to birds translocated to Maine from

Newfoundland. A few of these birds continue to nest at the island (five were sighted this summer). Among this group is White 52, the oldest translocated puffin who was 28 years old this summer.


# 1973–2003: THREE DECADES BUILDING

The Audubon Maine Coastal Islands Sanctuaries include 13 islands of which seven are actively managed sites that support 20 species of waterbirds with a total population of approximately 15,000 nesting pairs. The managed colonies are home to 95% of Maine puffins and 62% of the state's Razorbills. The islands are also home to 86% of Maine's endangered Roseate Terns, 67% and 65% respectively of Arctic and Common Terns and 65% of the state's Laughing Gulls. Each summer 18 seasonal staff, comprised of island supervisors and interns, work at Audubon's seven field stations and are actively engaged in all facets of research, monitoring and management, including the protection and restoration of colony sites. Resident field camps are established each summer in May and are occupied continuously through mid-August to insure that nesting species are protected. Without resident staff on the islands, Herring and Great Black-backed Gulls would quickly exclude most other seabirds and the colonies would be vulnerable to disturbance by predators such as mink and owls, as well as by unsupervised human visitors.



# **EASTERN EGG ROCK**

# Alan D. Cruickshank Wildlife Sanctuary

his seven-acre, treeless island is owned by the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (MDIFW). The island is noted for being the first restored eabird colony in the world. All species that were historically present are now nesting here again, including 59 pairs of Atlantic Puffins and 163 pairs of Roseate Terms - the largest colony of this species in Maine. A tent camp was established in 1973; it is the first of our Maine field stations. The "Egg Rock Hilton" (a 12'x12' wood structure) was built in 1979. It has withstood many tropical storms and tides so extreme that seaweed was delivered to its doorstep.

his 5.5-acre treeless island, located

# **POND ISLAND NWR**

Situated in the mouth of the Kennebec River, this 10-acre island was home to more than 300 pairs of Common Terns this summer and two pairs of endangered Roseate Terns. Interns use a 12'x12' expedition tent as their base camp. The program began in 1996 in cooperation with the Petit Manan NWR.



# STRATTON ISLAND

# Phineas W. Sprague Wildlife Sanctuary

The island is owned and protected by Audubon, and has been managed by the Seabird Restoration Program since 1986; cooperating closely with the Prout's Neck Audubon Society. Stratton Island is home to several species that are at the northern or southern limit of their range, including Black Guillemots and American Oystercatchers. The island is home to Maine's most diverse heronry and one of the state's most important Common and Roseate Tern colonies. Thousands of shorebirds roost here during migration. A large expedition tent was donated by Moss Tents for use as a field staff base camp.

# **MATINICUS ROCK**

This 27-acre island is part of the Petit Manan National Wildlife Refuge. Audubon and its founders have worked to protect seabirds here since 1900. It is home to Maine's largest colonies of puffins and Razorbills. This year, 256 pairs of puffins nested, and the Razorbill colony increased by 25% to 211 pairs. Field staff live in the venerable granite lightkeeper's house constructed in 1846.



# **SEAL ISLAND NWR**

ur program began on this 65-acre, treeless island in 1984, in cooperation with the Petit Manan NWR. Once the largest puffin colony in mid-coast Maine, puffins were extirpated here by 1887 due to excessive hunting. The puffin restoration techniques developed at Eastern Egg Rock have been replicated and refined on Seal Island. The puffin colony is increasing by more than 20% each year and the island also hosts Maine's largest tern colony. A 12'x12' wood cabin serves as the field station.

# Social Attraction Tech

Social attraction, the technique of encouraging seabirds to establish new nesting colonies through the use of decoys, mirrors, sound recordings and artificial burrows, was pioneered by Audubon's Seabird Restoration Program (SRP) at Eastern Egg Rock in 1973. The technique has been used worldwide in at least 12 countries for at least 39 seabird species by about 61 agencies and organizations. In addition, the technique has also encouraged nesting of colonial landbirds such as Purple Martin and rare species such as Blackcapped Vireo that prefer to nest near each other.

While social attraction alone does not always result in new colonies, the chances of success increase with the translocation of chicks and removal or exclusion of predators. The importance of techniques for establishing or relocating colonies to habitat that is safer from predators, human disturbance and flooding is certain to increase as coasts become increasingly crowded by development. This often leads to a reduced number of nesting places where seabirds may compete for already-scarce fish, and become exposed to pollution, disturbance and predators. Carlos served as Island Supervisor on Seal Island NWR this summer. He learned about seabird restoration 👼 techniques and Maine seabirds, while supervising the field team.

# **Summer Puffin-Watching Tours**

Rain and fog dampened the puffin-watching scene this summer, but a respectable total of 3,809 people came out on a total of 84 boat tours to Eastern Egg Rock. The tours this summer were led by veteran puffin watcher and education coordinator "Puffin Pete" Salmansohn, education intern Clifford Blizard from the State University of New York's School of Environmental Science and Forestry, and naturalist Tom Mullin of New Harbor, Maine.


This summer, viewers worldwide enjoyed intimate glimpses of terns and puffins on Eastern Egg Rock by visiting our

website to watch the live-streaming video. The camera, an invention of Daniel Zatz of SeeMore Wildlife Systems, based in Homer, Alaska, is a weather-tight unit with a lens so clear that viewers in the mainland visitor center can read details on tern leg bands! Using signals transmitted via microwave, visitors to the Audubon center in Bremen, Maine could move the robotic camera in all directions, and zoom in for close views. Viewers at home could observe seabirds as if they were peering from windows in an island observation blind. The camera was removed from the island in mid August, but it will again return to our website in late May 2004.
