## Seabirds

The 2019 field season across our Islands has officially ended! Researchers from all seven Project Puffin islands are flocking back to base to compile data and share highlights. About 75 seabird biologists and volunteers across Maine participated in the annual Gulf of Maine Seabird Working Group (GOMSWG) conference at Hog Island. They presented the highlights of the summer and gave preliminary research reports about tracking seabirds, ecology and monitoring methods.

## Puffins

Early looks at GOMSWG data show an excellent year for Atlantic Puffins, with 188 confirmed nesting pairs on Eastern Egg Rock, a record-high from last year's 178 pairs! Seal Island NWR has also reported a healthy population of 573 pairs, up from 565 in 2018.

#### Terns

Eastern Egg Rock's Common Tern count for 2019 shows a steady number from last year, with 1067 nests. While terns are now slowly leaving the islands, a large number remain to finish chick

rearing and the start of the fall migration.

## Other Bird News

 The Eastern Egg Rock Brant remains on the island, joined by more than a hundred Ruddy Turnstones.
